

## REPEAT FROM THE TOP



Mele Kalikimaka means Merry Christmas, but not in actual Hawaiian. The Hawaiian language has no R or S, so it was a challenge for native speakers to say the phrase, much less spell it acceptably. Plus, in Hawai'ian, consonants don't come at the ends of syllables or in clusters. But there is some conceptual alignment here: One of the actual meanings of "mele" means "in one's honor." Kaliki = "the exulted" and Maka is a term of endearment to a favorite child or person.
